Previously attributed to Jan Brueghel the Elder, An Van Camp (see literature) has recently re-attributed this drawing, amongst a group of eleven so-called Nuremberg Drawings to his son, Jan Brueghel the Younger. Matthias Winner (see literature) had initially described four drawings as belonging to this group of topographical views showing the region. They are united by their comparable signatures and the place name mentioned below the images: *Joan breugel 1616 In neurenberg* or a variant spelling. Our drawing has a directly comparable inscription and date and shows a location 300 kilometers from Nuremberg.
